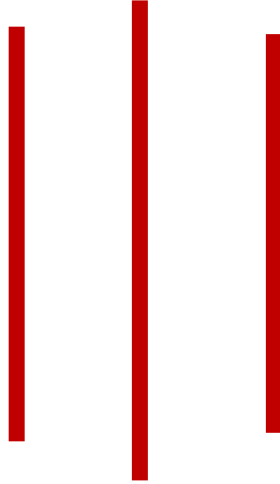
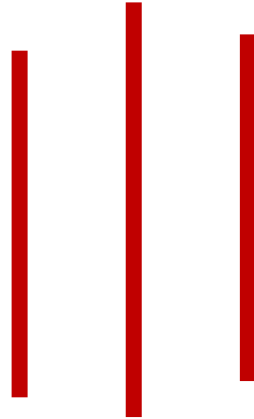


# SAHARA NEPAL

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## **Introduction/Background**

Sahara Nepal is a non-governmental organization (NGO) registered under the Section (4) of the Organization Registration Act 2034 BS and affiliated with the Social Welfare Council under the Section (13) of the Social Welfare Act 2049 BS of the Government of Nepal in 2051 BS (1994 AD). SAHARA is an autonomous and non-profit making non-governmental organization groomed from grass root level and led by young, dynamic and result-oriented development professionals. Sahara Nepal has witnessed an exponential growth in terms of its institutional capacity and the frequency of its deliveries. An over a Score of time of experience has awarded Sahara with a higher degree of credibility and a higher degree of reliability in its service delivery mechanism.

To this date, Sahara has been a dedicated brand name often uttered in the realm of community empowerment, vulnerability risk reduction, public health, good governance and humanitarian services. 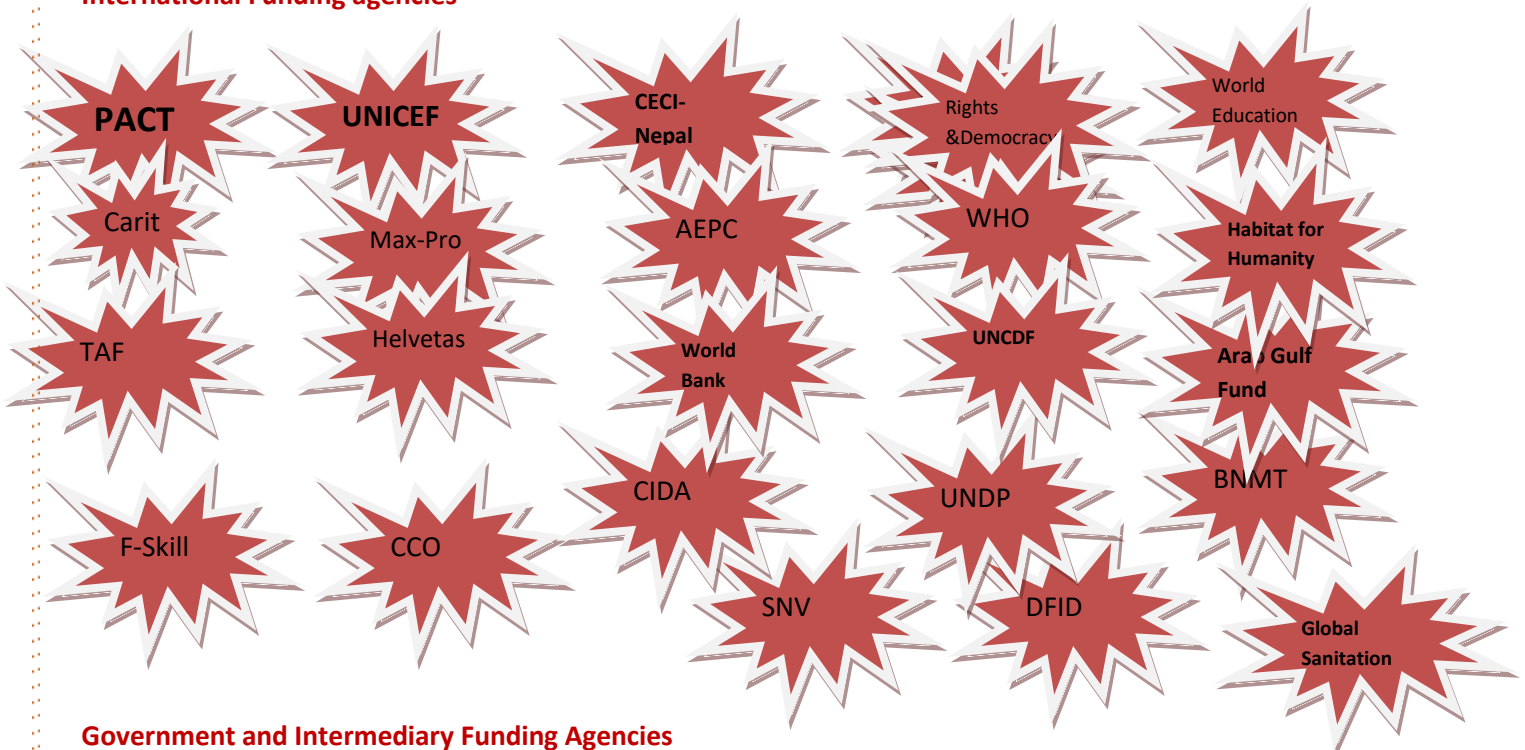

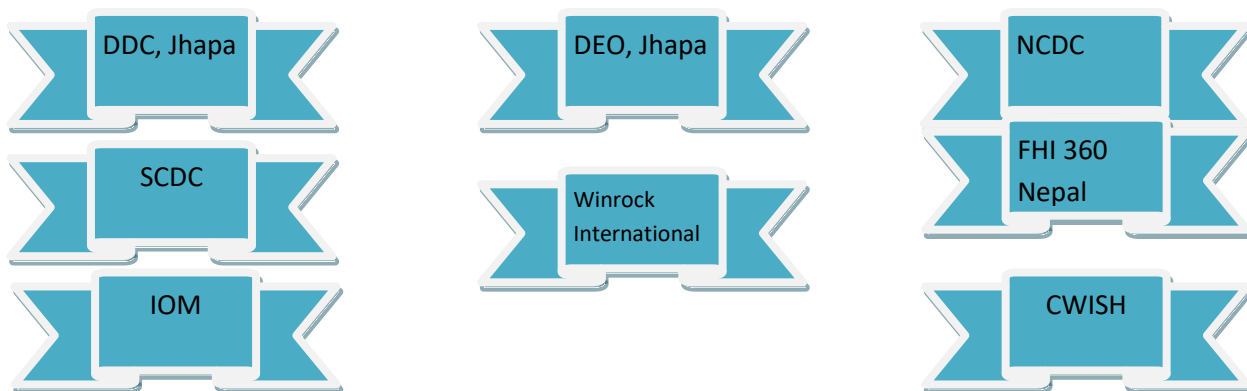

<b>Project Background</b>	<p>Sakchyam Access to Finance Programme under UKAID and Sahara are jointly implementing the project entitled “Technology Enabled Poultry and Goat Value Chain Financing”. The project, pertaining to poultry and goat value chains, is being implemented through its scale-up program in its second phase in 40 branches of five districts of State-1 namely, Ilam, Jhapa, Morang, Sunsari and Udayapur. The project aims to establish sustainable value chain systems for commercialization of poultry farming and goat rearing by using latest efficient technology.</p> <p>The project intends to establish access to finance and technical support to scale up their technical knowledge and financial capacity. Social inclusion is at the center of this project, which will encompass 95% women and 40% DAGs as its target groups. The project will turn remarkable in boarding poultry and goat value chain actors those operating their business in sporadic and scattered manner, forming strong production, processing and marketing lines. The project intends to increase production of goat and chicken meat for self-reliance on meat and meat products.</p>

Project Background	<p>Sahara Nepal has been partnering with Habitat for Humanity since 2005 for providing safe shelter to the underprivileged section of the society esp. families with poor housing conditions. Various efforts have been made in the past in this regard for promoting and constructing disaster-resilient, low-cost houses using local &amp; eco- friendly construction materials like mud, bamboo, etc.</p> <p>The housing programs have been implemented in close coordination with the local Govt. Likewise, Community Housing Program is being implemented in partnership with the local Govt. and Sahara Nepal Saving &amp; Credit Cooperative Society Ltd. In this program, low-cost houses are being constructed in the remote and rural areas of Jhapa district in seven urban and rural municipalities. Project Background	<p>Water is one of the basic human necessities but a large proportion of the Nepalese population is devoid of access to safe and adequate drinking water. In some of the rural regions of Nepal communities still rely on getting their drinking water from tube wells. As only 27 percent of the population has access to basic sanitation, those without access rely on local surface water sources like rivers for bathing and washing clothes. At the same time, the establishments of water treatment facilities throughout the urban and rural regions are limited. As a result, Nepal faces a high number of water-borne diseases <u>such as diarrhea, dysentery, typhoid, gastroenteritis and cholera</u>. The demand for water is increasing significantly in Nepal and access to safe and adequate drinking water is crucial. Taking this scenario into account, the Govt. of Nepal implements Rural Water Supply &amp; Sanitation Improvement Project for constructing Water Supply Schemes in remote rural areas of Nepal.</p>

## Sahara Nepal's Support during COVID-19 Pandemic

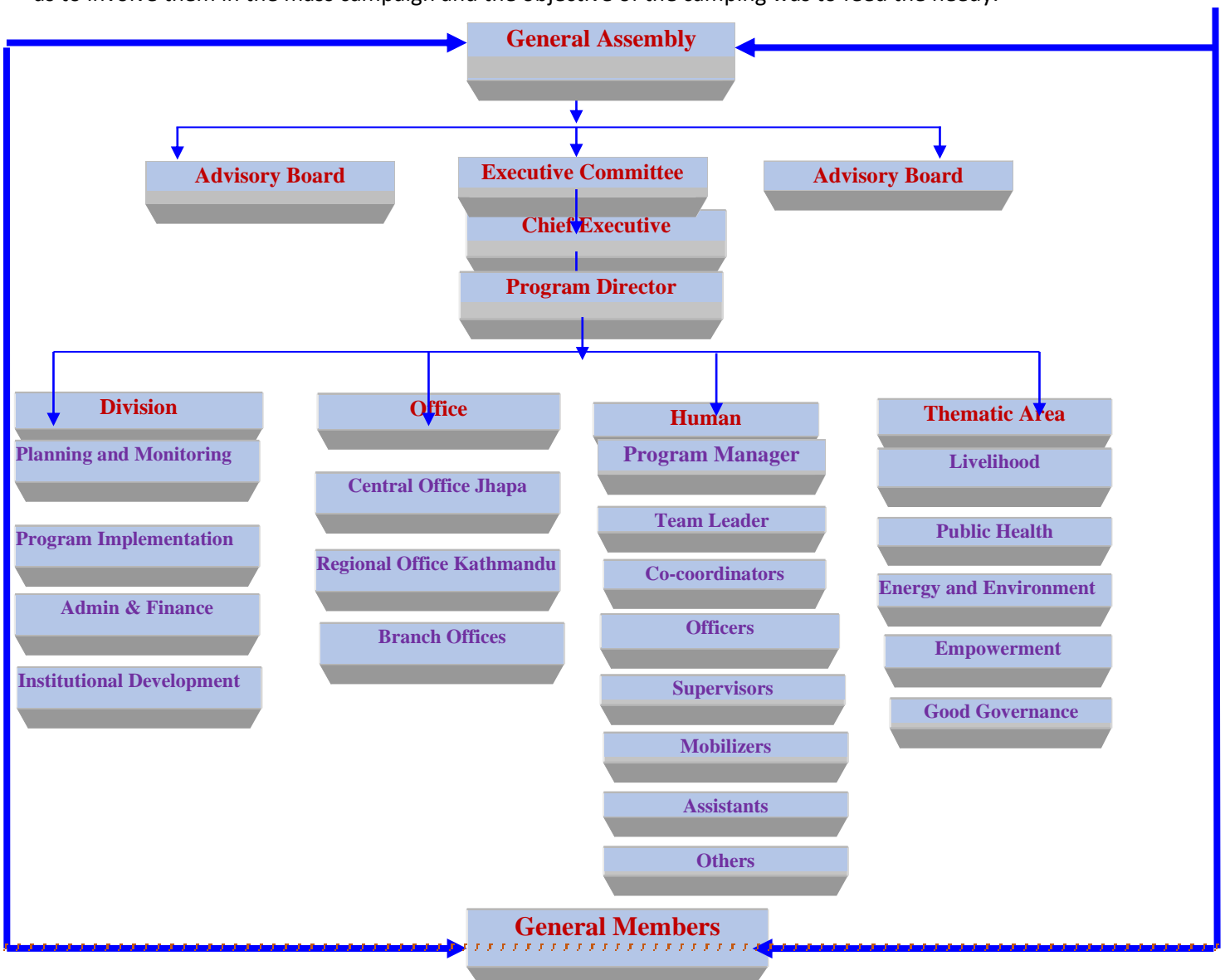
The COVID-19 pandemic has led to a dramatic loss of human life worldwide and presents an unprecedented challenge to public health, food systems and the world of work. The economic and social disruption caused by the pandemic is devastating: tens of millions of people are at risk of falling into extreme poverty.

Millions of enterprises face an existential threat. Nearly half of the world's 3.3 billion global work force are at risk of losing their livelihoods. Informal economy workers are particularly vulnerable because the majority lacks social protection and access to quality health care and have lost access to productive assets. Without the means to earn an income during lockdowns, many are unable to feed themselves and their families. For most, no income means no food, or, at best, less food and less nutritious food (Joint statement by ILO, FAO, IFAD and WHO).

During the pandemic and unprecedented lockdown caused by the government of Nepal; Sahara Nepal initiated a campaign to support the government and general public with basic health and food was appreciated by all. Sahara Nepal initiated a campaign called "EK KA LAGI EK ABHIYAN" was a successful with mass participation. Some to the activities carried by the campaign are highlighted below:

- Campaign on WASH program was carried out in all the six districts of Sahara Nepal working area
- Distribution of face mask and sanitizer along with PPE
- Relief materials provided to poor and marginalized families of the communities
- PCR lab established at Kankai Municipality
- Provided cash support to Palinkas
- Supported in managing quarantines

The above-mentioned activities were carried out in close coordination with the local people, CBO's and local government as to involve them in the mass campaign and the objective of the camping was to feed the needy.



## Success Story

### **Shifting from traditional to Improved Goat Farming**

Doing some sort of business is much worth then going aboard and sweating in the Gulf countries, 'is what Basuda Muktan Pradhan of Nayabazar Ilam a micro finance member of Sahara Nepal SACCOS said'. She had been planning to rare goats on commercial scale since past three years, as she was engaged in rearing only few goats in traditional way. Her dream of enlarging her business came into reality as she knew that Sahara Nepal is backstopping with technical and in-house trainings to commercial goat and poultry rearing members. She then decided to go for commercialization on goat rearing. She approached Sahara Nepal Nayabazar Branch (a branch established in support of Sakchyam Access to Finance Project) for loan process. She had to buy a buck of better quality to improving the breed of goats, as well improving shed which was a challenge as she lacked the skill.



Sahara Nepal's intervention on improving breeds, technical support on Goat and Poultry, shed improvement, and credit support for commercial Agriculture further supported her to build confidence to take 300 thousand loan (based on Group Guarantee). The business plan developed in the processing of Loan helped her determine the required loan.



She took the Basic training of Goat health and husbandry training organized by Sahara Nepal under 'Technology Enabled Poultry and Goat Value Chain Financing Project, (UKaid/Sakchyam). The training helped her to know the basics in managing and developing nursery for fodder, identification of diseases and vaccination. However, Goat rearing was a school for her as one of the major roles of technical team was door to door visit of the farmers. Further, She had a good linkage with nearby agro-vet for required services and had some discounts on her service bills.

In the beginning, she had the problem of fodder since she had limited fodder in her farm. She gradually expanded and planted fodder in all the virgin land she had. Now she has enough fodder to feed her 50 plus goat.





## Building trust through livestock insurance

Chandra Maya Limbu a permanent inhabitant of Dharan Municipality ward - 6, Panmara tole is one of the potential goat farmers. She is an active member of Sahara Nepal SACCOS Dharan Branch Micro- finance group number 54 and had started goat farming from the past three years.

Like most of her neighbors; she too was rearing goat in traditional way, one day in the center meeting of microfinance group veterinary technician from Sahara Nepal SACCOS suggested the members to do commercial goat and poultry farming and also assured her for technical support in times of need.

She was then informed about the basic level goat health and husbandry training that was about to take place for the commercial members of Dharan branch, she participated in the two days basic training on Goat for goat farmers where she was suggested to make improved type of goat shed, She was oriented about different types of diseases, medicines and insurance of goats for risk cover if her goat dies. As per the suggestion she called the technician of Sahara Nepal for goat insurance where the goat owner only pays 25% of the premium amount and other remaining premium amount is paid by Government of Nepal to the insurance company, and 90% of the valuation amount will be returned in case of goat dead and which can be claimed legally. Sahara Nepal SACCOS is tied up with Shikhar insurance company/NAI for goat insurance.

Chandra Maya had 8 goats and the entire goats were insured. However, in the same year her 3 goats died due to pneumonia and a claimed was made for all the three goats after all the required documents were prepared. She received the sum of Rs 34200 from the insurance company. She then bought 5 kids from the money she received from the insurance. Now she has 18 goats in her shed. She is happy with the decision of insuring her goats. Now she is in process of improving her shed as per the advice of the technical supervisor of Sahara Nepal who is in close contact with her. She has a plan to increase the number of goats and reach at least 50 in a year or two. She has own a land on lease for forage production, which is must for goat rearing farmer.

She believes that insurance of goat can make farmers are liberated from the fear of being lost of capital due to the death of the goats from different diseases. Now, she has started encouraging her neighbors and relatives about the benefits of cattle insurance.
